APARTHEID KILLS COMMUTERS!

STOP THE TRAIN MASSACRES IN SOUTH AFRICA!


Exactly one year ago, 26 train commuters were killed and 137 injured near Soweto in South Africa. Not in an accident - but in a cold-blooded operation by members of a specially trained army unit.

Many of the victims died praying. They were holding a prayer service whilst travelling home - a common practice amongst black commuters in South Africa. The recent 'Inkathagate' exposes have revealed that the South African regime was implicated in this brutal massacre - and many others.

The regime that created apartheid has shown that it will stop at nothing to cling to power in a 'post-apartheid' South Africa. The discredited De Klerk regime, talking peace but making war on black people, is clearly unfit to steer South Africa towards peace and freedom.

ON 13 SEPTEMBER 1990...

Train no. 9436 left Johannesburg's Jeppe Station at 5.10pm. Six men, now known to belong to a secret army hit-squad trained to spread terror and conflict, suddenly produced shotguns, pistols and machetes and began to kill at random...

An isolated incident? No - between July 1990 and May 1991 at least 58 people were killed and 387 injured in train attacks. Thousands more have died in township violence, often instigated by Inkatha - aided and abetted by the South African Police and their secret funding.

PEACE PROCESS AT RISK

The exposure of the security forces' role in promoting violent conflict among blacks, in order to undermine the ANC and other forces striving for democracy, has produced only bland denials from De Klerk - and the demotion of two ministers.

Now an Interim Government - drawn from all sectors - is needed, to ensure the police and army act impartially, and create a climate of trust in which genuine negotiations can take place.

KEEP UP THE PRESURE!

After 27 years in prison, and 19 months out of prison, Nelson Mandela (and millions of others) still cannot vote. Instead of rewarding De Klerk prematurely by relaxing sanctions, we must maintain pressure on his regime. Sanctions and boycotts are still needed - until all South Africans enjoy the right to vote freely.
