
ANTI-APARTHEID MOVEMENT SOUTH WEST REGIONAL CONFERENCE

In the twenty years since its formation, the Anti-Apartheid Movement has expressed support for and solidarity with the fight against racism in Southern Africa. Its successes have been achieved by pursuing campaigns at every level of British politics, from the parliamentary lobby to the picket line. This regional conference has been called to give fresh impetus to the Movement's campaigns in the light of changed and changing circumstances.

SWAPO of Namibia, after the failure of the Geneva talks, face the prospect of an escalating guerrilla war against the South African troops that occupy their country.

In South Africa, police terror is intensified as the black population continues to resist forced transportation and slave labour.

The conference will hear from representatives of the liberation movements in both countries, and will consider local and regional campaign plans.

This is not a delegate conference, and is open to all members and supporters of the Anti-Apartheid Movement. 
