Nearly a year has passed since Nelson Mandela was released after 27 years imprisonment. Yet South Africa's most famous leader still cannot vote in his own country.


President De Klerk promises a 'new South Africa' - but apartheid still denies basic human rights to 4 out of 5 South Africans.

STOP THE REPRESSION!

- Thousands of political prisoners and detainees still languish in apartheid's jails - including 50 on Death Row
- Tens of thousands of political exiles cannot return home for fear of being prosecuted for opposing apartheid
- Repressive laws make free political activity impossible
 especially the notorious Internal Security Act.

De Klerk has not kept his promises to solve these problems have not been fulfilled. If he does not remove these obstacles by 30 April 1991, the ANC could find itself obliged to pull out of the negotiation process.

De Klerk's regime has orchestrated the appalling violence which has caused over 3,000 deaths in the past year. His police have promoted and condoned the so-called 'black-on-black' violence.

De Klerk has been talking peace whilst making war. He wants a negotiated settlement - but only on his terms. He is trying to undermine the ANC and other democratic forces. But the violence is endangering the prospects for peace, freedom and an end to apartheid.
