Apartheid is unique. It is a system of legal, institutionalised racism. There is enforced segregation in all walks of life — education, health, housing, employment, land.

In South Africa the white minority (16.6 per cent) is determined to maintain its position of power and privilege at any cost. Black South Africans are forced to live in semi-slavery:

- O their movement is controlled by the notorious Pass Laws
- Othe 'Colour Bar' denies them access to most skilled work
- O they have no effective right to strike
- O their trade unions are not legally recognised
- Oall legal and peaceful opposition to apartheid has been crushed
- O trade unionists have been banned, imprisoned, hanged and even tortured to death.

## FIGHT APARTHEID

British trade unionists have a special responsibility to act. South Africa was colonised by Britain — and it was the British Government which granted political power to the white minority in 1910. British companies have a massive stake — 60 per cent of all foreign investment — in South Africa's apartheid economy. Britain is South Africa's major trading partner. Britain's record is one of blatant collaboration with the apartheid regime.

Black South Africans have called for the isolation of South Africa. Numerous countries, organisations and individuals boycott South Africa but moves to enforce mandatory sanctions at the United Nations have been blocked by Britain and a handful of other Western countries. So unless British trade unionists and other opponents of apartheid act, Britain will be drawn more and more into defending the status quo — apartheid.
