SUPPORT THE ZIMBABWE FREEDOM STRUGGLE!

The Zimbabwean people have a right of self-determination - a right to decide their own future. We can help them by exposing racist lies in newspapers and on TV. But we can also actively campaign to stop British companies and the Labour government propping up the Smith regime, or attempting to install a black puppet government.

Support these demands:

Support the Freedom Fighters

The main force operating in Zimbabwe for majority rule is the liberation army. The victory of the armed struggle now in progress should be seen as a crucial element in the liberation of the country, rather than attempts to negotiate with Smith's regime. All such attempts under the auspices of British governments have been overwhelmingly rejected by the Zimbabwean population. Since the Labour government has always claimed to support majority rule it should demonstrate that it recognises the guerillas as freedom fighters, not as insurgents or terrorists.

2. No British government deals with Smith or Vorster

Vorster has no constructive role to play in bringing about majority rule in Zimbabwe, contrary to the image put over in the British media. As the most ruthless oppressor of black people in Southern Africa he has no interests in common with those struggling for liberation in Zimbabwe.

- 3. Stop recruitment of British mercenaries for Smith's army
- Automatic asylum for whites and Asians who refuse military service in Smith's army and fo: all other Zimbabwean political refugees
- 5. No attempt to buy out Rhodesian settlers
- 6. Compensation for the peoples of the neighbouring countries who have suffered as a result of their support for the Zimbabwean struggle
- Complete economic sanctions against Rhodesia and its South African ally
 No more Labour government excuses for companies like British Petroleum (BP),
 BP and Shell to stop fuelling Rhodesia's war machine.
- 8. Full Trade Union rights for Zimbabwean workers

All means of solidarity and support should be taken up by British Trade Unions to aid the struggle of Zimbabwean workers for the rights of organisation, free speech and assembly within the workplace.

9. No military 'peace-keeping' intervention which infringes the Zimbabwean people's right to self-determination.
