TEA HAM SECURE £ 100 LOAN FOR RHODESIAN AND

GUARANTEES RAISED IN ONLY FIVE DAYS.

The University of East Anglia Anti-Apartheid Movement has segured a loan of £100 from the Students' Union, which will be donated in -- cdiately to the African National Council of Rhodesia.

After Treasurer Nigel Welby assured Student Council at its meeting on Thursday, January 27th., that he could see no financial objections to the terms of the loan, it was approved by the Council without opposition.

The loan was made possible by the generosity of 29 members of the University community (23 students, and 6 members of Faculty), who agreed to underwrite the loan for varying percentages of any outstanding debt, when the loan is due to be repaid.

The underwriters were told that the UEA Anti-Apartheid Movement fully expects to be able to pay back 100% of the loan by the ropayment date of 10th. June, 1972, but that if this was not the case, they would be liable for their agreed percentage of the outstanding balance.

The consistently positive response on the part of most people approached, illustrated that there is a definite potential at UEA for constructive action concerning Southern Africa.

Anti-Apartheid at UEA, is currently organising a wide variety of fund-raising activities, including, discos, food services, films, and book-stalls. One of the difficulties faced by Anti-Apartheid, is a shortage of manpower. Furthermore, however, an educational programme directed at schools in Norwich, is in its planning stages.


THE ATRICAN NATIONAL COUNCIL OF RHODESIA. by Richard Moorsom.

The ANC was formed soon after the announcement of the settlement last November, to meet the specific needs of a crisis situation in the history of Zimbabwe. Since the early 1960s, and especially since UDI in 1965, both the African Nationalists Mass Parties, ZAPU and ZANU, have been banned and their leaders incarcerated in prison, or in concentration camps in their hundreds. The African chiefs and headmen, created and employed by the Smith regime, have continued over the last couple of months to give him their "warm support". The centre Party, a small white "liberal" group, has protested plaintively, but did not find it difficult to accept the settlement. As all 16 African M.P.s belong to these two groups, African opposition to the settlement had no means of expressing itself - TV and radio time was to be restricted to "recognised" political parties. To fill the vacuum, a group of ex-detainess, Church, and other leaders of the African people came together to form and organise a platform; a forum through which the masses could express their feelings about the British deal with Smith. The eruption of African defiance over the past 2 weeks has become a measure of their success so far. Not that they had an easy time of it in mobilising the opposition. Many of them are still under orders restricting their movements - Bishop Abil Muzoreva, the leader of the ANC, is pre--vented from visiting the "Tribal Trust Lands" which form two-thirds of his docese. Many others have been picked up by the Security Police. recently. And all 200 applications by the ANC to hold meetings in the African reserves have been refused by the District Commissioners under orders from Salisbury; so have those put in by the pro-settlement Centre Party. The ANC's stated aims include: (1) "to call our people to realise the essential power of unity now. And move as one people for the sake of achieving our ultimate goal of freedom", and (2) "to explain, advise, and expose the dangerous implications that would result if we accepted the Anglo-Rhodesian constitutional settlement proposals".

But time is short; it has very few material resources, and by now, Rhodesian white politicians and employers have lost their inhibitions and are putting everything into persuasion, propoganda, or straightforward coercion, to force a "Yes" vote. It is vital that we give not just moral

but material support NOW to the leaders of the Zimbabwe people.
