



THE LAST COLONY IN AFRICA

Despite opposition from the black majority, and repeated United Nations rulings of illegality. racist S. Africa continues to occupy Namibia and to launch att- THE BRITISH NUCLEAR acks on the neighbouring Front Line States.

In the North of Namibia where a State of Emergency has existed since the '70s, the Kocvoet terror squads and 100,000 troops comit atrocities each week in an attempt to defeat SWAPO, the liberation movement of Namibia. SWAPO is recognised by the UN as "the sole authentic representative of the Namibian people."

"No person or entity...may explore for, take, extract, process, refine, use, sell, export or distribute any natural resources situated within the territorial limits of Namibia without the consent.... of the UN Council for Namibia "


FROM NAMIBIA TO PROGRAMME

British governments claim to have an overwhelming respect for international law and a loathing of "terrorism". So why have they done nothing to force S. Africa out of Namibia? Two key reasons are money and uranium.

- * In 1985 the UK multinational, RTZ made £26.5 million profit from its Rossing uranium mine in Namibia.
- * Between 1977 and '85, Rossing supplied 50% of British 'civil' uranium imports. (Much of this remains stockpiled.)
- * BNFL makes vast sums out of processing Namibian uranium for overseas customers.
- * Namibia and S.Africa are the only sources of uranium available to the UK military.

BLOCKADE NAMIBIAN URANIUM

A blockade of Namibian uranium imports into Britain would be a major act of solidarity with SWAPO. It would also be in the interests of people in Britain, whether they are campaigning for peace or for same energy policies.



BNFL THE TARGET

BNFL (British Nuclear Fuels Ltd) is a 100% state-owned company and it is crucial to Britain's continuing exploitation of Namibian uranium. All uranium imports into Britain are delivered to Springfields. From there is either enters the dual military-civil fuel cycle or goes into a stockpile.
